Pro-life display creates discussion, tension

Students might need a strong stomach for the next few days. For the next three days, Justice For All will display graphic depictions of abortion in both the Bosco Student Plaza and the quad, with smaller displays scattered about campus.

Tammy Cook, director of field operations for JFA, was at the quad display Monday, where she took questions from Melissa Divine's women's studies class. "Our mission is to travel to universities and set up the exhibit so that university students can learn about abortion, because they're not going to receive this information in class," Cook said.

Both supporters and dissenters attended that first day of the display.

"There's still going to be people on both sides of the issue on all campuses so we do hear from people on both sides," Cook said.

Divine, instructor in women's studies, said although she did not support the group, she supports free speech on campus. "I can't do that unless I'm willing to support all speech even speech that I find reprehensible," she said.

The graphic nature of the display elicited a variety of emotions, she said.

"...experienced first hand [at the KSU Exhibit] what I have suspected for so long; that it is easy for the pro-abortion advocates to dismiss and even marginalize those who are pro-life and yet not medical professionals. What I instead saw was that it was very hard, if not impossible, for them to dismiss my education, training, and expertise in the free debate of ideas and what might be true or false in this context.

This was particularly demonstrated when the Women's Studies class came out to interact with the volunteers, of whom Tammy displayed uncommon kindness, compassion, and humility in such a winsome way as she interacted with a mostly hostile group of people....

At the end of my interaction with the [Women's Studies] class, one student...at a loss to debate the known medical facts behind abortion...turned to an area where she thought she could seize the day. She said, "Well then, do you eat meat?" I answered that I did, and then she proceeded to berate me for the inconsistencies of being a meat eater and yet a defender of unborn humans. What a further confirmation of the fuzzy thinking among today's youth.

I am...struck that most physicians do not ever begin to use their power (which is sometimes quite great and influential in society) that they have just by their title and education, and yet it seems that there are many who are more than willing to use that power for evil, perhaps just by their sidestep of the debate of ideas and the willingness to be identified with people that many might consider "extreme or backwards."

I am glad to be so associated with those...who love life and love the unborn, and have the courage to face detractors to that philosophy.
