

Bowling, Special Needs, and Lessons Learned



Dear Family and Friends,

I never thought that watching a game of bowling would cause me to be teary-eyed, but, then again, this wasn't your ordinary bowling game. I was watching my cousin Korey, and others with special needs, bowl at the Special Olympics in Oklahoma. There were people of all ages around me with a variety of disabilities and struggles, and even though they were different from me, they were all unique and valuable.

The two things that stood out to me most in this community of special needs athletes was the joy and love that surrounded them. I don't know if I've ever been in a room with that many excited people at one time. They were smiling, laughing, and cheering each other on with great passion. Happiness filled the room. Those who weren't competing, such as the family members of those with special needs, surrounded their athletes with care, support, and love. It was inspiring to see the devotion that these families and friends had toward their athletes.

Suddenly I thought of all the conversations I've had in which someone has told me, "Well, if the child is going to have a bad quality of life, I think that abortion should be an option for the parents of those children." I wished that each person who said this could witness what was taking place in that bowling alley. As I observed the athletes around me, it was apparent that having special needs does not entail having a horrible life. I also began to think about the fact that if all of those athletes were suddenly gone, there would be a deep, deep hole in many people's hearts. And, on a much greater scale, there would be an even deeper hole in the world. My cousin Korey, though he struggles with disabilities, brings gifts into my life that only he can give.

It's easy to say that having a "bad quality of life" should be an important factor in the abortion issue. I can agree that growing up with health struggles or living in poverty would be extremely difficult. However, if the unborn and those with special needs are human, then why would their value be based upon external things (like what their life will be like, how intelligent they are, etc), instead of the kind of thing they are? Put simply, we are valuable not because of what we can do, but because we are human beings created in the image of God.

I must remember that I am also made in the image of God. Sometimes when life gets hard and I get overwhelmed, I want to run away. I want to hide under my covers to protect myself from the potential pain of the outside world. Just like my cousin Korey, I too have gifts that only I can give. Through my epiphany at the bowling alley, God helped me to recognize that He has created me
