One guy with really long hair spewed water from his mouth in mock disgust on the sidewalk in front of the signs. Amazing! I had always thought that people were opposed just to the graphic pictures of abortion, but this was a response to non-graphic pictures of human development.

Is this really the society we live in, people where despise our message that the mere question of when human rights begin elicits should mockery? I lost some of my faith in humanity that day.

Thankfully, not every student was so closed to dialogue. Most were willing to

talk about the question of when human rights begin. One thing I like about the new sign is that it starts the conversation off with that question.

I asked one girl where she would draw the

line for the beginning of human rights, and she took a marker and drew it all the way over at the newborn infant. Yes, she was actually pro-infanticide. She raved about Peter

Singer, a Princeton bio-ethicist who believes that a human is not really a "person" until it is self-aware, which does not happen until months after birth.

We were having a productive conversation until another student wanted to jump in. This interrupted our dialogue, and by the time I got out of that conversation, the girl was gone. She told my colleague Tammy that we

> were having a great conversation until we were interrupted. I was glad to hear she felt that way, and I hope our conversation helps her to rethink her stance on human value.

I struck up a conversation with an older man who was looking at the kiosk. We agreed on the abortion issue, so I asked why he is

pro-life. In this case he said it was because of his religious beliefs. I asked what those are, and he said he is Mormon. Then we began an

interesting discussion about the planet Kolob and God's supposed wife, among other things. I challenged his views about God, the Bible, Jesus, and the Book of Mormon. We traded emails to stay in touch. I hope he is willing to actually take a look at what he believes in light of the Word of God.

He also offered help and support through his church should she decide to keep the baby. Kevin said he feels confident that she has all the information she needs to make an informed decision.
