Should a "Man" Stop a Woman from Murdering Her Toddler?

As three guys approached the JFA poll table, one was brave enough to sign the notebook to share his opinion on abortion. His two friends walked away. As he signed "yes" to the question, "Should abortion remain legal?", I inquired as to why he felt this way. He responded, "Because I believe a woman should have a choice and I shouldn't have any say in that. Middle-aged white men shouldn't restrict these women. It is a woman's choice." We discussed the humanity of the unborn child and if a man's opinion mattered in the cases of born children being murdered. He began to realize what his stance on abortion meant. We talked for about 30 minutes before one of his friends literally came back and drug him away. Fortunately, about one minute before his friend came to steal him he admitted, "You have convinced me. I have never really thought about this [abortion] in this way." He did take two seconds to release himself from his friend's grip, run back to shake my hand, and say "Thanks, my name is Zouma."
