She was yelling at a young man who had just tearfully shared with everyone within earshot that he suffers *every day* knowing his girlfriend aborted their child. His heart is broken in pieces, and she tells him his feelings don't matter? The nerve!

'Sam' was staring at the Exhibit with a dejected look on his face. I thought he was upset that we were there... Far from it:

Catherine (C): What's on your mind?

Sam (S): These pictures are really hard to look at.

C: I agree - they really are. What's on your mind as you look at them?

S: Well, a while back my girlfriend and I got pregnant. She was scared and thought having a baby would ruin her chance at college and ruin her life. I told her that I wanted the baby and

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that I would pay for everything and raise the child myself.

C: Wow - good for you! What did she say?

S: She said she was going to get an abortion. I asked her not to - I begged her! But she did it anyway.

(Silence.)

S: Now, every time I see a child the age mine would be, I'm reminded about what happened. (With tears in his eyes) I could have a seven-year-old kid right now that I could be teaching how to play baseball!

C: (Tearing up, too) I'm so sorry!

S: You know, I'm *all for* women's rights, but when did women's rights become so important that they *trump* men's rights - and fathers' rights?

C: I don't know, and I've heard so many stories from men like you who are hurting after abortion. Women don't even have a place in our society to grieve their aborted children - let alone men! Have you ever talked to anyone else about this?

S: No, you and your director, David, are the first people I've ever told.

C: There's a couple of great ministries I've learned of for men who've had experiences with abortion. Do you want more information about them?

S: (Taking out a notepad and pen) Definitely!

I was then able to connect Sam with orgs (See below) that offer counseling and support to help men heal from past abortion experiences.
